Book Review

"Living with a Stoma" by Dr Craig A. White. Published 1997 by Sheldon Press ISBN 0-85969-754-1 £6.99

This book deals with the practical and psychological aspects of life with a colostomy, ileostomy or urostomy.

The opening chapters deal with the 'medical mechanics' of different types of stomas and describe the hospital experience. The various medical tests which may be done and the stoma operations are all explained.


A chapter entitled 'The stoma care routine' tells you everything you need to know about appliances (bags), describing the different types and how to change them etc. This chapter also contains an excellent 'leakage troubleshooting guide' and helpful charts to use when trialling new appliances.

The following chapters deal with the emotional aspects of life with a stoma. As the author is a clinical pyschologist by trade, these are explored in depth often using a workbookstyle 'question and answer' approach. Techniques for overcoming anxieties and depression are also suggested.

The effects stoma surgery may have on relationships are discussed openly. A chapter entitled 'Sex, intimacy and stomas' addresses the personal questions we are often too shy to ask, as well as the questions we most frequently do ask. There is also a chapter offering sound advice on lifestyle and diet.

Overall rating? 9 out of 10. Essential reading for those facing stoma surgery and old-time ostomists alike.


