

Letters to the Editor

We have received a very interesting communication from Eric Midson of Slough, one of our members. His story is rather interesting and we feel that you would like to hear about it.

Eric was born in 1927 with Hirchsprung's disease. This is a congential disorder affecting the bowel, tending to run in families and occurring about four times more often in boys than in girls. He considers it a 'dreadful complaint'. He was 22 before he heard of St Mark's hospital in City Road where he came under the care of Sir Nauton Morgan "who gave me a Colostomy and later a Sigmoid Colostomy". Later, he was under Sir Alan Parkes who advised him that a reversal was not an option; he then had a lleostomy.

Eric writes of the primitive appliances he was offered in those days. Firstly "a plastic box like a lunch box with a rubber bag hanging below the box, held on by an elastic belt", this he rejected. "Next was a belt with three buckles and four holes in the front with a saucer fixed by four knobs and padded with cotton wool gauze". This was also rejected. He was treated by Mr James Thompson and later by Mr Cohen. All of these surgeons he describes as extremely pleasant to know, they put his mind at ease. Being a devout Christian he feels helped him to live through his problems and not to become suicidal.

In addition to all those options already mentioned, about six years ago he had a Urostomy. He is an Insulin dependant diabetic and partially deaf. He regrets not having heard of St Mark's Hospital earlier and thanks everyone at St Mark's for their professionalism though he is still wistful about the demise of the position of matron. Despite all of Eric's problems, he still works tirelessly raising money for Cancer Research with stalls at fetes and with his collecting box



Personal Profile of Bowel Incontinence - PEC Procedure by Glenda Simmons

I have battled with bowel incontinence for some 28 years, after suffering a third degree tear at the birth of my first child, which my GP had repaired on the assumption that I would be fine. It took 5 years of feeling alone, frightened, worried and ashamed before I managed to tell my GP what was really causing the anxiety I was being treated for.

I was referred through the Royal London Hospital to St Mark's Hospital, where several tests were done and I had a Post Anal Repair. Unfortunately, the rpair made the incontinence worse, but in those days there was nothing more that could be done. I had suffered from constipation from childhood and I noticed these were the times when passive leakage was worst, so it became a regular thing to juggle food, fibre and laxatives together in order to keep the constipation away and keep the incontinence to a minimum.

At the age of 50 the constipation became chronic and the incontinence was happening 10 or more times a day and was only controlled by unpleasant manual evacuation.

The local Hospital Consultant referred me back to St Mark's where I had similar tests carried out again and given the bio-feedback treatment. Sadly this didn't work for me, and other medicinal remedies were tried but the only thing that worked was rectal enemas. These were time consuming, messy and extremely painful. The alternative was a full Colostomy which is something I could not personally accept.

My consultant Nurse Specialist, Prof Christine

Norton and Colorectal Surgeon Mr Richard Cohen, proposed a new technique called Percutaneous Endoscopic Colostomy - PEC procedure. This uses a small standard PEG (Gastrostomy) tube inserted into the Sigmoid Colon through which I would irrigate enema and water to wash-out the lower bowel whilst sitting on the toilet as normal. I knew immediately this would be much more accepable to me and decided to go ahead.

The PEC procedure is minimally invasive and can be done under local anaesthetic via Colonoscopy, although my own was carried out under General Anaesthetic for other reasons. I now irrigate my bowel once a day using one fleet enema followed by 500ml of boiled water. It is quick and easy to use, pain and strain free. It takes 20 minutes from start to finish. The tube is taped neatly to one side when not in use and I hardly know it's there.

The PEC has proved to be a highly successful, minimally invasive surgical procedure which is a very attractive and safe alternative to a Colostomy for Continence.
